



Chairman Speaks To Congressional Delegation

"A Pat on the Back and a Problem"

OMMISSION CHAIRMAN John W. Harsh of Magnolia spoke to the Arkansas Congressional delegation in Washington on May 1 relative to the proposed revenue-sharing bill and stressed the state's need to keep the highway trust fund intact if improvements to the highway system mileage are to continue.

Harsh recognized each member of the delegation for his individual interest and involvement in the state road program. Congressman Mills was cited for his efforts in obtaining funds for I-630 through Little Rock, Congressman Hammerschmidt for his support of a Kansas City-to-the Gulf interstate freeway route, Congressman Alexander for his endeavors in extending an interstate or expressway route in the Memphis-Kansas City and Little Rock-St. Louis traffic corridors, and Senators McClellan and Fulbright for seeking federal funding for bridges across Lake Norfork on U.S. 62 and Highway 101.

Harsh's hometown newspaper, the Daily Banner News, summarized his comments on their editorial page. We have reprinted it herewith:

An Editorial

LACK OF FUNDS MENACES ROADS

"During the next twenty years, Arkansas will need \$4.5 billion for highway improvements. This is a minimum figure designed basically to maintain, improve and extend the present system. It does not, for example, include provision for a major north-south highway. The projected revenue available to meet the need totals only \$2.7 billion. This alarming reality contained in a National Highway Functional Classification and Needs Study was reported to a group of Arkansans by State Highway Commission chairman John W. Harsh in a speech in Washington Monday night.

Mr. Harsh embellished his dismal news with the announcement that there are forces at work which threaten these already meager resources – forces which include mass transit interests seeking to raid the Federal Highway treasury for money and an

Administration-backed revenue sharing plan which would award money for highways more on the basis of population – a potential disaster for Arkansas with its scant 2 million people

The need for an adequate road system, particularly. South Arkansas is vital. Without good roads, industry will look elsewhere to settle, and tourism, a most promising source of outside dollars, will never develop beyond its present modest state. And unless we prefer to live out our days in pastoral obscurity quietly watching our educational system fail and our municipal, county and state services deteriorate for want of the dollars provided by these two sources we had better fight for what we need.

Fortunately, some of the tools to fight are at hand. Arkansas has perhaps the most influential Congressional delegation of any state in the Union. We should urge them to resist any attempt by Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe to dip into highway funds for mass transit subsidy in core cities. Indeed, the cities are in trouble with transporting people in and out, but it is precisely because they took most of the highway money available through the years and built enormous concrete funnels called freeways which added a whole new dimension to the word "bottleneck". Now they want to take another bite out of the pie and bail themselves out of a mess which may be beyond cleaning up.


Our Congressmen should also defend us against revenue sharing proposals emphasizing population which would simply make the big get bigger — a trend which should be reversed not nurtured. Our interests as a nation would be better served by dispersing people to many communities — not concentrative them in urban ghettos where crime, pollution and poverty arrampant.

We must also do our part. Mr. Harsh has suggested that a 2 cent increase in local gasoline taxes as proposed by Governor Bumpers is a fair way to raise money for highways and would certainly help. To those who argue that higher gasoline prices would discourage the very tourist industry we are trying to develop, Mr. Harsh responds that the visitor to Florida is not disturbed at paying a little more for gasoline if he is going where he wants to promptly and comfortably. An increase in gasoline taxes is a reasonable alternative and worthy of more public debate.

The citizens of Arkansas are a resourceful and independent people represented by an exceptionally influential congressional delegation. We must not accept our lowly position among the 50 states with resignation and apathy but rather with a sense of outrage and high purpose. We must defend what we have and fight harder for what we want."

Harsh in his concluding remarks, said: "Gentlemen, your action in Congress which has made a great portion of these funds available is greatly appreciated both by those of us directly involved in providing the highways, and by the people of Arkansas who use and depend on them Since I am a highway man, hope you didn't expect me to speak on any subject other than highways."

U.S. 79 Bridge Dedicated

construction at Pine Bluff since 1968 were dedicated and officially opened to traffic on Wednesday, May 3. A projected traffic count estimates that the bridge will carry 15,000 vehicles per day by 1987. A five-day count made immediately after the bridge opened showed that it is already averaging 6,264 vehicles per day. The remaining two lanes are expected to be completed by July 1. The structure has two 30-foot roadways divided by a concrete median barrier. It is 2,501 feet long and rises 60½ feet above pool level. The cost of the bridge and 2.4 miles of approaches was \$8,529,644.

Contractors were San Ore Construction Company, Inc., of Houston (substructure and grading) and H. E. Cummins & Sons Construction Company, Enid, Okla. (superstructure and surfacing).

Ferd M. Bellingrath, president of the Pine Bluff

Chamber of Commerce which co-sponsored the dedication with the Highway Department, was the master of ceremonies. He introduced several legislators, mayors and candidates present. Senator John L. McClellan was the dedicatory speaker to some 300 persons gathered for the occasion. Commissioner Lawrence Blackwell, who lives at Pine Bluff, introduced other Commission members and administrative officials.

Dr. John Lindsay of First United Methodist Church pronounced the invocation. The Arkansas 61st Air Force Junior ROTC of Pine Bluff High School presented the colors. The Pine Bluff High School band, with Wayne Childers directing, played a prededication concert.

Misses Lane, Laurie, and Lindy Sullivan of Louville, Kentucky, granddaughters of Commissioner Blackwell, cut the ribbon.

OLD BRIDGE BEING DEMOLISHED

Dismantling the old truss structure, which had ansported traffic across the Arkansas at Pine Bluff since 1915, is already under way. The old bridge, built by the Jefferson County Bridge District and a private group, was designed as a combination railroad and highway bridge, with rails inside the trusses and highway traffic being carried on cantilever brackets outside of each truss. Early plans to build an interurban route between Pine Bluff and Stuttgart failed to materialize and the railroad was abandoned in 1921. Later the center section was concreted, converting it to highway traffic, which practically abandoned the plank-floored outside lanes. After World War II they were also concreted by the Highway Department.

LUNCHEON AT ADMIRAL BENBOW

A luncheon was held at Admiral Benbow Inn by the Chamber of Commerce for special guests at the dedication. E. Harley Cox, Chamber vice-chairman, spoke on the vast long-range highway needs and the dim prospects of realizing them. He compared other states' gasoline tax with Arkansas' and advocated the State borrow money, just as a business does, in order to peed up the needed road improvements.

A choral group under the direction of Richard Smith provided entertainment. After the luncheon, guests were transported to the dedication site atop the new bridge in an air-conditioned bus.



Two Lanes of New Main Street Bridge Opened

On MAY 23 the two completed northbound lanes of the new Main Street Bridge were opened to traffic with the old Main Street Bridge being converted to one way operation southbound. Traffic in the downtown area of Little Rock did not appear affected.

Closing the Broadway Bridge the following Thursday morning after the peak traffic period was another story. Despite advance publicity of the bridge's closing, hundreds of motorists headed for the Broadway Bridge just as they always had, resulting in the most massive traffic jam to develop in the city in years, particularly in the areas of Markham Street's intersection with Scott and Main streets, and Broadway.

When motorists were stopped at the foot of the

bridge on Markham, they had only two ways to go—east on Markham (now one lane because of the convention center construction) or west on Markham, which meant making a circle back around through the business district to get to either the Freeway Bridge or the new Main Street Bridge. To worsen the situation, the temperature was 90 degrees at 5 p.m., with the sun boiling down from a clear sky. Overheated, vapor-locked cars became the order of the day.

The cities of Little Rock and North Little Rock and the Department have in close cooperation instituted several measures designed to provide relief to the traffic congestion. In North Little Rock parking has been banned on Main Street from 4 to 6 p.m. for






Above: A concrete barrier protects pedestrians' walk from traffic lanes on new bridge.

northbound traffic. Maple Street has been striped for one northbound and three southbound lanes. The City of Little Rock banned parking on Main from 7 to 9 a.m. for southbound traffic and provided a direct connection from the old Main Street Bridge to Louisiana Street. On June 12, the old Main Street Bridge was converted to two-way operation from 4 to 6 p.m.

The Broadway Bridge was closed for alterations necessary to accommodate river navigation. It will be osed several months. The southbound lanes of the new Main Street Bridge will be opened about January, 1973.



Bridge, Airport Dedications At Marked Tree

THE DEDICATION OF A NEW BRIDGE over the St. Francis River on U.S. 63 was part of a two-day celebration which drew the largest turnout of citizens to Marked Tree in many years. Festivities which had been planned weeks in advance began on Friday night, June 2 with a street dance, a moonlight madness sale and an unveiling of the petrified form of the original marked tree which gave the city its name. The tree, which had lain in the river since a flood in 1890, was recovered and moved to a base prepared for it downtown. The tree was marked with a large "M" by early settlers to denote the site as a portage point between the St. Francis and Little rivers.

Saturday morning's activities included a fly-in, an exhibition of antique planes and an air show featuring aerobatics by the Mid South Skydiving Club of Memphis prior to the dedication of a new airport.

The afternoon bridge dedication was preceded by a parade which included a caravan of antique cars. The parade began downtown, crossed the new bridge and disbanded at the high school. Some 3,000 people were on hand to see Governor Bumpers and Mis Arkansas (Marilyn Morgan of Clarksville) snip the ribbons at both ceremonies. Governor Bumpers was



he principal speaker at the airport dedication. Also participating in the ceremonies was FAA representative Hugh Lyon.

Highway Director Ward Goodman, a former resident of Marked Tree, made the dedicatory address at the bridge. In his remarks he pointed out that the structure being dedicated was the third bridge to be built across the St. Francis River at Marked Tree. He quipped, "Already I've outlasted two bridges." Governor Bumpers and Commissioner Maurice Smith also spoke briefly.

Other special guests included Lieutenant Governor Bob Riley, Mrs. Bumpers, Assistant Director and Mrs. Henry Gray, District Engineer Sam Smith and several other Department officials, local legislators and Mrs. Goodman. Mayor Jess Waskom was in charge of the gala weekend which was held as an appreciation event to the Highway Department for road improvements made in the Marked Tree area during the past several years.

The bridge was built by Folk Construction Co., Inc. f Memphis at an approximate cost of \$266,000. It was financed with all state funds. C. C. Parton was the resident engineer.

Gap On I-40 Closed

On June 30 the Highway Department and the Altus Chamber of Commerce formally opened and dedicated 20.2 miles of I-40 between Clarksville and Ozark. Altus is about half-way between the terminii. The dedication was held at the Highway 186 interchange.

Completion of this section, long-awaited by highway users, closed the gap on I-40 through Arkansas except for approximately five miles comprised of the Mississippi River Bridge and its approaches at West Memphis. The bridge and the approach from the Arkansas side are virtually complete. The Memphis approach is under construction and is expected to be completed late this year or early in 1973. Opening of the bridge will be delayed until that time; however, motorists can travel the breadth of the state and even beyond on four-lane controlled access highway by using the present I-55 bridge.

The entire length of I-40 reaches east from Greensboro, N. C. westward to Barstow, Calif., 2,410 miles, of which 285 are in Arkansas. It is the fourth longest route in the nation's 42,500 mile interstate network. The first I-40 contract in Arkansas was awarded in October, 1957.

Vehicle miles traveled on the portions of I-40 open in 1970 were 1,038,270,000. Projected mileage by 1975 is 1,338,524,000. If you cannot comprehend how many miles that is, it's the entire length of I-40 from North Carolina to California 555,404 times!

Total money authorized to date in the planning and construction of the highway is \$215,691,000. Of that amount, \$15,283,000 was expanded in right of way acquisition.

Route Historically Significant

While skimming along the broad stretches of the four-lane divided highway in the Ozark foothills at 70 or 75 miles per hour in a modern auto, it is difficult to conjure up how wearying and wearing a trip along virtually the same location was by Overland stagecoach in 1858, even under prime conditions such as a mild day in May. After Congress authorized New York businessman John Butterfield to carry mail westward from St. Louis and Memphis to San Francisco, Butterfield organized the Overland Mail Company. On September 16, 1858 two stages departed St. Louis and Memphis just before noon with Butterfield himself in charge of the St. Louis coach. Traveling along a road which would hardly be considered a passable trail by today's standards, the Memphis coach passed through Little Rock and along the Clarksville-Ozark route. It reached Fort Smith a few minutes before the St. Louis coach arrived, scarcely more than 14 hours after departure, thus

shaving three hours and eight minutes from the scheduled time. A welcoming party greeted the Memphis stage first and then everyone, including the Memphis stage riders, greeted Mr. Butterfield and the St. Louis stage. With the nation's interstate system now nearing completion, a motorist can drive from Little Rock to the east coast in 14 hours. (Wouldn't Mr. Butterfield have liked to operate the mail service under those conditions!)

Some years after the mail service was begun, telegraph wires were strung along the road, causing it to gradually become known as the Wire Road, particularly after completion of a transcontinental railroad brought on the discontinuance of stage service. Nearby Highway 292 and a county road extending throug Johnson, Franklin and Crawford counties supposedly follow the actual route of the Old Wire Road more closely.



A tourist information center opened in December of 1971 on I-40 at West Memphis was formally dedicated May 18. It is located two miles west of the I-55 pterchange.

The center, the seventh to be put into operation through a cooperative effort of the State Parks/Recreation and Travel Commission and the State Highway Department, is one of the most strategically located service facilities in the state. It was needed so badly that service was begun sometime before it was completed. During the month of April the center served more tourists than all of the other six in the state combined.

The center was constructed by Bituminous, Inc. of Pine Bluff under the supervision of the Highway Department at an approximate cost of \$560,000. The Highway Department maintains it. It is staffed, stocked with tourist materials and operated by the Parks/Recreation and Travel Commission.

Governor Dale Bumpers, who made the edicatory address, Lieutenant Governor Bob Riley, Miss Arkansas (Marilyn Morgan), Highway Commissioners John

Harsh, Maurice Smith, George Kell, and the Parks/Recreation Commissioners were among the dignitaries present. The Governor told a crowd of some 250 persons that tourism is now taking its rightful place in the state's expanding economy. He said that whereas a projection had been made of \$300 million to be spent by tourists in Arkansas during 1971, the actual figure was \$340 million. He anticipates that by 1975 the firgure will have increased to \$500 million.

It was a special day for State Senator W. K. Ingram of West Memphis who was the master of ceremonies. He proposed legislation in 1965 which appropriated


certain state funds to be used in the construction of the centers.

The East Junior High School Band played prior to the 11:00 a.m. ceremonies. The Headquarters 5th Howitzer Battalion of the National Guard presented the colors after the invocation was pronounced by Father Charles Filiatreau of Holy Cross Episcopal Church.

The Chamber of Commerce was host to a number of invited guests at a luncheon at Holiday Inn following the dedication. State Rep. Lloyd McCuiston, Jr., Chamber president, was the master of ceremonies.







DISTRICT 2 HEADQUARTERS BUILDING BEGUN; contract awarded for District 3

Construction of a new headquarters for District 2 at Pine Bluff has begun and a contract was awarded May 24 for the construction of a new headquarters for District 3 at Hope.

Work on both headquarters will be done under one prime contract each. Each facility will include an administration and maintenance building capable of being used, as an emergency operations center, a resident engineer's building, a service station, a chemical storage building, an equipment storage building and site

improvement work. A radio equipment building will also be constructed at Pine Bluff.

The style of architecture and overall layout will be the same as headquarters already in use at Wynne, Batesville, Camden, Russellville, Harrison and Paragould. The exterior of Pine Bluff's building will be gray brick. District Engineer John S. Harris tentatively plans to occupy the new facilities late this year.

The Pine Bluff headquarters is being constructed by Jack Morgan Construction

Co. of England, Ark., on a 31-acre site on U.S. 81 on the Pine Bluff-Gould road.

Hope's headquarters will be built on a 30-acre plot at the northeast corner of I-30 and Highway 29 north of Hope by Bush Construction Co. of Hot Springs. The building will face I-30 but entry will be gained from Highway 29. This is the tenth, and last, of a long range building program to provide each District with an adequate field operations building.

Williamson Elected To NSPE



Resident Engineer James B. Williamson of El Dorado was recently elected a national director of the National Society of Professional Engineers. He is a member and past president of the Southwest Arkansas Chapter of the Arkansas Society of Professional Engineers and is presently a director on the State ASPE Board. Williamson is a graduate of the University of Arkansas and a registered civil engineer. He has been with the Highway Department 11½ years and a resident engineer since May, 1966.

Williamson is active in the South Arkansas Shrine Club of the Scimitar Temple, where he is past president and now serving as a director. He is a member of the El Dorado Toastmasters Club, a Webelo leader and a committeeman for Troop 13 of the De Soto Area Boy Scouts. He is a member of First Baptist Church.

Jim is a native of Star City. He is married to the former Earlene Adams of Fouke, who is currently serving a president of the State Ladies' Auxiliary of ASPE. The Williamsons have two sons and two daughters.

ARKANSAS HIGHWAY USERS CONFERENCE Hears Summary Of Future Highway Needs

A RKANSAS HIGHWAY COMMISSIONERS AND ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICIALS are looking to either an increase in full taxes or a bond issue to continue the Department's highway construction improvement program.

Commissioners and officials speaking for the Department have been using every opportunity for several months to acquaint citizens with the effects of proposed revenue sharing bills and what their passage will likely mean to Arkansas, and to talk up the Department's most favorable alternative, the issuance of \$300 million in bonds. In recent weeks the state of Mississippi has just passed a \$600 million bond issue supported by a one cent increase in gasoline tax.

Last month Civic Club spokesmen sought the support of the Arkansas Highway Users Conference in pushing the bond issue. Commissioners John Harsh and Lawrence Blackwell, and Director Ward Goodman explained the findings of a recent highway needs study to a meeting of the Conference which was attended by representatives of various associations and agencies interested in better highways.

In the words of Chairman Harsh, "The name of the game is money." Pine Bluff Chamber of Commerce representative E. Harley Cox urged highway users to start prodding their state leaders into taking the lead for a \$300 million bond issue for highways. Governor Dale Bumpers vetoed a 1971 Legislative proposal to put a bond issue to the people for a vote but he has since indicated he might now support a bond program. The figure of \$300 million was decided on, said Director Goodman, because that is the amount the Commission feels it can repay. He said the Department needs much more.

"Decision Has to be Faced."

"Whether he wants to or not, every citizen will soon have to face the decision of which direction he wants the state's

highway program to go," Blackwell said. "I don't consider that we on the Highway Commission are spending the citizen's tax dollar. I look upon it as an investment that is coming back to the welfare of the state by some 10 fold."

For many years (so many, in fact, that most citizens have forgotten and take it for granted) designated monies have gone into the Federal Highway Trust Fund to be used only for the construction of highways. The transportation revenue sharing measure being discussed would allow that fund to be divided and shared by states and cities for use on all forms of transportation. A complex division of the money has been formulated on the basis of population, urban concentration and poverty. An effort by opponents of the bill to shorten the program to 4½ years by reducing the amount \$2.7 billion was

defeated. Funds set up for interstate construction will not be distrubed.

The American Roadbuilders Association, which has actively supported defeat of the revenue sharing bill since it was first proposed, said that its passage would be a mortal blow to the eminently workable federal-state highway building partnership. . . which has provided the United States with the world's finest highways system. Dissolution of this partnership in favor of a state-by-state highway program of fragmented development would. . be nationally catastrophic and a grave disservice to the nation's citizens, highway user and nonhighway user, alike."


The Arkansas Highway Users Conference is a chapter of the American Highway Users Conference which has similar groups in most of the states.



Mississippi Passes \$600 Million Highway Package

In an unprecedented action, the Mississippi State Legislature last month passed a \$600 million highway program, constituting the largest public works program in the history of the state. Mississippi's three highway commissioners realize the challenge before them and have pledged themselves to meet it. The program, which calls for the construction of 1,200 miles of four-lane highways, will get under way very soon. Another significant piece of legislation passed now allows the Highway Department to obtain right of way through condemnation. Previously the Department could only obtain a right of entry upon judgement in the Circuit Court and deposit 75 percent of the appraisal, a procedure which sometimes stretched into years.

Signs To Meet The Need



Problems of modern traffic are calling upon the ingenuity of officials to devise ways of getting the message over to motorists. In Nevada an eye-catching "Cattle Grazing" sign not only

carries the words and the silhouette of a cow, but it also has especially rigged "horns" so that a pair of red flags can be affixed to the top of the sign for emphasis! In Rochester Minnesota the city's main attraction — a flock of Giant Canadian geese — are protected by this "Geese Crossing Area" sign where they cross Broad Street from their habitat on Silver Lake to the city park to graze. The reason the geese are such an attraction is because the Giant Canada variety was thought for many years to be extinct until 1964, when a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service authority on Canada geese identified them.



Oklahoma Turnpike Closes Restrooms

The Oklahoma Turnpike Authority has closed its public restrooms on the Indian Nation Turnpike near the South Canadian River because of vandalism, abuse and misuse. According to the Turnpike engineer, conditions became so bad that the restrooms, constructed for continuous use, were closed at night. Even with daytime-only use, the facilities became a health hazard which the Turnpike Authority could not tolerate. The Authority says it is sorry to deprive the public of the conveniences but that the public had only itself to blame.

Snoopy Rescued With A Pipe Cleaner

It was all in a day's work to Virginia Highway Department maintenance supervisor James Burge but it was a most unusual and joyous occasion for a 12-year-old youngster and his mutt, Snoopy when Burge rescued the adventurous Snoopy after being entrapped in a culvert for three days. Snoopy ran into a culvert which was practically blocked at one end with dirt. There wasn't room to turn around and, having only a canine's reasoning power, the dog didn't know he could back out. Burge made short work of the rescue with a "pipe cleaner", a tool made from a scoop welded to an 8-foot piece of galvanized water pipe and threaded on one end so that extensions can be added. It is used routinely in culvert maint nance. Burge prodded the dirt — and Snoopy — out the blocked end of the culvert, into his master's waiting arms. 






Several District 8 employees have retired recently. Earl Hankins, who worked with the Pope County crew, retired after more than 23 years of service. Bruce




