

From the Director's Desk

A Department To Be Proud Of!

At the many meetings I have attended this year as Director, I have found that people throughout the State are very interested in knowing more about the Highway and Transportation Department. Civic groups, Chambers of Commerce and other interested groups are concerned about the future of highway projects in their areas and are supportive of our efforts to provide them with a highway system they can be proud of.

Over the years, this Department has developed a reputation of being one of the top highway and transportation departments in the nation. We have developed this reputation through hard work and dedication from our employees. We have shown the public that we are good stewards of their tax dollars.

Figures released earlier this year by the Federal Highway Administration bear this out. The Arkansas State Highway and Transportaton Department ranks 49th in administration costs. We spend only 3 percent of our total disbursements for administration, while the national average is slightly above 7 percent.

This speaks well of our Department, especially when you consider that we have the 16th largest highway system in the country and rank 33rd in State highway-user revenues. We have more State highway mileage than Florida (which ranks 5th in highway-user revenues), and Michigan (which ranks 9th in revenues). New York has the 15th largest highway system and is ranked 6th in highway-user revenues. Not many people are aware of that fact. We are doing more with less money, and we should all be proud of that fact.

At the 2020 Forum held in April, one of the speakers noted that there are twice the number of commuters on the roads today than there were 30 years ago. Automobiles are multiplying twice as fast as people and more American households have at least two vehicles. This puts a tremendous burden on our highway system. We have become a mobile society. We are accustomed to going where we want to, when we want to. In the past, very few of us gave much thought to the highway system that makes our convenience of travel possible.

Fortunately, this is changing. The public is aware of the importance of good highways. They are demanding that this Department maintain those highways and make improvements to our system that will enable them to continue the growth and development of the past. We have proven to them that we are capable of meeting that challenge and they will not be disappointed.

Tourist Information Center Dedicated at Harrison

Approximately 200 people were on hand Tuesday, May 24 for the dedication of the Harrison Tourist Information Center. The Center, which is located about one mile north of the airport road in Harrison, is the eleventh Tourist Information Center to be built by the Highway and Transportation Department. The Information Centers are a joint effort between the AHTD and the Arkansas Department of Parks and Tourism. The AHTD builds and maintains the centers, while stafing is provided by the Tourism Division of the Parks and Tourism Department.

Governor Bill Clinton provided the keynote address for those in attendance, and he had very kind words for the residents of Boone County. Clinton stated, "The kind of balanced economy that has been achieved here is what I spend most of my time working on in other parts of the state. You have the economic ideal - an almost perfectly balanced economy. You have a manufacturing base, you have a strong small business base, you've got a powerful tourism base, you've got a very strong system of education, and you've got a good system of transportation which we hope will be better in the years ahead."

Clinton went on to state his support for the TIC concept, saying, "The thing I like about these centers is they work. They work because tourists stop in here." He said he hopes to have a twelfth center open in the near future in Siloam Springs.

Arkansas Highway Commission Chairman Bobby Hopper spoke on the history of the Harrison TIC. He explained that the

Project was first programmed by Highway Commission in 1971, but funding never came about because it was given a low priority in the Revenue Stabilization Act. The AHTD managed to get the drives, parking lot, and picnic facilities built in 1979 as part of the widening of Highway 65 from Harrison to Bear Creek. Hopper credited the State Legislators from the area for seeing that the project was not forgotten and was becoming a reality.

Jim Fram, Executive Vice President of the Harrison Chamber of Commerce, acted as Master of Ceremonies for the dedication. Others who spoke include Dan Harness, Mayor of Harrison; Cliff Gale, Boone County Judge; Ken Savells, President of the Harrison Chamber of Commerce; and Joe Rice, Director of the Tourism Division of the Parks and Tourism Department.

Following Governor Clinton's remarks, AHTD Director Maurice Smith, presented the keys to the center to Joe Rice. Rice, in turn, passed the keys to Herb

Center. Dunn unlocked the frontdoor and proclaimed the center officially open for business. Visitors have already been streaming into the center which opened unofficially on Tuesday,

Dunn, who will manage the

May 17. During its first five days, the center was visited by 1,198 tourists. That total only includes those who made inquiries; it does not include persons who only stopped to use the restrooms or picnic facilities. Daily totals rose steadily from 138 on the opening Tuesday to a high of 324 on the first Saturday. The largest percentage of visitors have come from Arkansas, Missouri and Texas, but others have been counted from as far away as England, Holland, Australia, Switzerland, and Canada.

Mike Bishop's Country Time Jamboree provided the entertainment for the dedication, while soft drinks and popcorn were furnished by the Harrison and Mountain Home Chambers of Commerce.

The Highway Commission awarded a contract to F.B.R. Company of Harrison on July 16, 1987 for the \$124,336 Center.

America's Future Depends on it 2020



Forum Held in Little Rock

"Transportation 2020" is a multi-year effort initiated by the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) to identify highway and transit needs through the year 2020. This is being accomplished by holding public forums in all fifty states. Arkansas' version of "Transportation 2020" was held April 6 at the Arkansas Game and Fish Auditorium in Little Rock. Approximately 135 people attended the forum which was co-sponsored by the Arkansas Highway Users Conference and the Arkansas State Highway and Transportation Department. The goal is to develop a national consensus on surface transportation policy and programs that the country can follow into the next century.

Panelists at the Arkansas forum included Maurice Smith, AHTD Director; Arkansas Highway Commissioners Bobby Hopper, Raymond Pritchett, Ron Harrod, Rodney Slater and Bill Clark; Frank Francois, Executive Director of AASHTO; Carlton Robinson, Executive Vice President of the Highway Users Federation; Lynn Zeno, Chairman of the Arkansas Highway Users Conference; and Sheffield Nelson, Chairman of the Arkansas Industrial Development Commission.

Thirty-seven persons presented oral testimony and fielded questions from the panelists. Searcy automobile dealer Frank Carder brought out some historical data and explained that Americans a driving more these days. He stated there are 110 million commuters in the Nation today, twice as many as 30 years ago, and the average person traveled 8,000 miles in 1986, up from 4,000 in 1960. Carder, a member of the National Automobile Dealer Association's Project 2000 task force, commented that "in 1986, Americans drove 1.78 trillion miles, and every one of those miles was on our highway system."

AHTD Chief Engineer Charles Venable presented the Department's views on the Federal role in highway funding. "We believe that there has to be some type of Federal role in provision and protection. This does not mean that we seek to keep the status quo," Venable said. "I think any future Federal aid program must be equitable. The donor-donee status has got to be resolved."

Bill Paschall, of the AGR/T Council, expanded further on the Federal role, stating, "Right now there is a checkbook balance of about \$9.6 billion in the Highway Trust Fund that we are not utilizing due to budgetary concerns. We feel that it is imperative to remove the Trust Fund from the unified budget and that we expend the money on highway projects" Paschall said.

Sharon Priest, Little Rock City Board member and member of the Transportation Policy Committee of the National League of Cities, spoke about ways to raise and target funds for the most critically needed transportation improvements. "New funding sources need to be considered by local and state governments such as traffic impact fees, roadway improvement districts, and where appropriate, roadway tolls," Priest said. She also addressed the issue of further taxing the highway users for non-transportation purposes, stating, "We need to be cautious about current proposals for increasing federal transportation excise taxes in order to reduce national deficits - deficits that have been created by the same people who now want to shift the burden to highway users."

Other speakers addressed such topics as user fees, the proposed Economic Development Corridor Improvement Program, rural road maintenance and development, and highway safety.

The Arkansas "Transportation 2020" forum proved to be beneficial according to Francois, as have the thers around the country. He commented that, "These hearings are the only good mechanism that we have for going out to the users themselves and asking them to tell us what they perceive as the needs. From an AASHTO viewpoint, we are achieving what we wanted."

Working in a Man's World? That depends on who you ask...


"Istill want to be treated like a woman - I am a woman. But, on the job, I am the Area Foreman. I am not a male or a female. I am the Area Foreman. That's the way the crew reacts to me and I react to them," states Holton.


Sammie Holton, 41, a ten-year Department employee, became the AHTD's first female Area Foreman last October. She is currently responsible for the maintenance of Miller County's 203 miles of state highways in District 3, which is cludes an 8-mile section of gravel road, 4 unpaved frontage roads, 17 miles of Interstate highways, and an AHTD operated ferry crossing the Red River. Holton must also work in conjunction with crews from two bordering states, Texas and Louisiana. In fact, Stateline Avenue (Highway 71) is literally split down the middle, with Arkansas responsible for the two northbound lanes and Texas responsible for the two southbound lanes. The center left-turn lane is split half-and-half.

Her road to be Area Foreman can hardly be described as commonplace. Although born in Arkansas, she spent the majority of her life in California. While there she was a labor-relations representative for McDonnell-Douglas Aircraft Corporation in Los Angeles. "I never had any dreams of running heavy equipment or working on the roads - never in my life," Holton said. But in 1975, she and her two daughters moved to Sevier County near her father. She didn't find much of a need for a union negotiator or an arbitrator in southwest Arkansas, so someone suggested she try the Highway Department. "I figured I needed a job. I enjoy the outdoors anyway, so I figured, why not go for it." A persistent 3 months later she was hired as a flagger in the Sevier County Maintenance Crew.

Of those early days, Holton relates: "I was the first female Sevier County ever hired. It wasn't so much me getting over it, but the men getting over the fact that I was out there - that I was out there to stay and that I was going to do my job. Once they learned that I was going to do my fair share, we got along great

Holton says that after she got on at the Highway Department and started learning what all was involved in road maintenance, she became very interested. From flagging, she moved up to driving dump trucks

and operating backhoes and loaders. Then she went to running a motor patrol, being a finish operator, and finally a crew leader. "It wasn't just step by step," she said. "I had to be patient."

When the Miller County Area Foreman position opened up last year, Holton knew she wanted to try for it even though it meant she would have to leave the crew she had spent more than nine years with. She has no regrets about her move now, even though she still maintains a house in the hills of Sevier County. She says she likes to go there once in a while to "get out of the big city (Texarkana)."

Although she has an office on Highway 237, just south of Texarkana, she finds herself on the road 99% of the time. As Area Foreman, she travels all the roads she is responsible for twice a week. She tries to schedule work about two weeks in advance for the crew of 18 men she supervises. "This is the nicest, most accepting crew I've ever seen in my life," she says. "I haven't had any problems with them. I just couldn't ask for a better crew."

In addition to her crew, Holton also supervises the use of seven dump trucks, eight tractors, two motor patrols, a backhoe, roller, and chemical sprayer. She also must keep the proper amount of supplies stockpiled at the Area Headquarters for use in emergency situations, such as the four inches of ice that covered the roadways in early January. "We worked ten straight 24-hour days," she said.

"I wish I could tell you something that hasn't worked for me since I've been here, but everything has just gone so well," Holton states with a confident smile. "Sometimes, I think coming to to work that everything's going to fall apart on me, but it hasn't so far."

So, what does the future hold for Sammie Holton?

"I'm very happy here, but I'll just go with the education and abilities I have. My goal is just to go as far as I can."

EEO Section Sponsors Contract Compliance Conference

Part of the responsibility of the EEO Section, of the Human Resources Division, is to ensure that employees of contractors, and applicants for employment with contractors, are not discriminated against. Subcontractors, vendors, and material suppliers who wish to do business with prime contractors must also be assured of the same non-discriminatory treatment. With this in mind, the Highway and Transportation Department's EEO Section sponsored a Contract Compliance Conference on March 16.

The purpose of the conference was to provide an open forum to discuss equal employment, training, and the special provisions that are accorded disadvantaged business enterprises (DBE's) in Federal-aid contracts.

Representatives from AHTD, Federal Highway Administration, Department of Labor, and various highway construction contractors participated in the conference.

In his opening remarks, AHTD Director Maurice Smith said, "Our basic philosophy is that people affected by Federal-aid programs should receive the services, benefits, and opportunities to which they are entitled. Our desired objective

is to ensure that this is accomplished."

All of the contractors listed with the AHTD were notified of the conference. Representatives of agencies performing similar or related dutionwere also invited.

A survey was conducted to analyze the effectiveness of the conference. The comments received indicated that the conference was informative and the audience was pleased with the manner in which it was presented.

Employees Attend Construction/Maintenance Conferences

Springtime generally means clean-up time to most Arkansans, but to AHTD Construction and Maintenance personnel, it also means statewide conference time. The 1988 version of the Construction Conference was held March 23-24 at the Central Office Auditorium, and the Maintenance Conference was held April 27-28 at the same location.

Each group spent two days hearing presentations concerning their respective areas of responsibility. Director Maurice Smith greeted each group, commending them for jobs well done in the past and extolling them to continue good work in the future. He stated that Arkansas has one of the best overall highways programs in the Country. Much of the credit for that must go to the Highway Commission, he said, but credit also most be given to the Department employees for carrying out the Commission's directives.

About 200 Resident Engineers, Assistant esident Engineers, and other construction perconnel attended the construction conference. Topics covered ranged from new materials and techniques of interest, to an in-depth report on the Highway 71 Relocation Project between Alma and Fayetteville, one of the most challenging projects the Department has ever undertaken. A highlight of this year's Construction Conference was a banquet held on the evening of March 23 at the Holiday Inn West. The banquet was attended by all the members of the Highway Commission as well as the Construction Conference participants.

Approximately 175 Area Foremen, Maintenance Supervisors and Maintenance personnel shared ideas and learned about the latest technologies regarding the upkeep of the state's highways and bridges at the Maintenance Conference. Smith told the group that, "this Department has the reputation of being a good steward of the public's tax dollars. That reputation is what has enabled the Department to be successful over the years in obtaining the additional funding necessary to carry on our successful highway program." He also stated that the emphasis is swinging away from the building of new roads to that of maintaining what we already have.

Safety Consciousness Pays Off!

According to figures compiled by James Mansfield, Safety and Training Section Head, Highway and Transportation Department employees experienced another good year in the area of safety. The 1987 totals showed there were 316 personal injuries, 206 motor vehicle accidents, and 51 equipment accidents recorded for a total of 573 mishaps. As recently as 1979, the total was more than 1,000 mishaps.


For recording purposes, the Department uses the term "accident" to designate mishaps involving motor vehicles and equipment, while the term "injury" designates an incident involving harm to a person.


Of the 316 personal injuries recorded, 131 (41%) required the victim to miss time from work. This is an impressive statistic in light of the fact that AHTD workers logged nearly 8.7 million hours of work in 1987.

Motor vehicles were driven a total of almost 38.5 million miles by AHTD employees in 1987. Ninety-eight (47.5%) of the 206 accidents recorded were deemed preventable on the part of the AHTD employee involved. Nearly half of these preventable accidents occurred while employees were backing vehicles.

"Our on-going concern is to create a safetyconscious work place," Mansfield said. "We want to make it as safe as we can, consistent with the requirements of the work responsibilities."

The improved safety statistics are a direct result of a conscientious training program. The continuous update of the existing departmental training program and the development and implementation of an improved training program are important priorities of the Safety and Training Section for the upcoming year.

Summer Employment Program Expanded

The AHTD has expanded its summer employment program for students to include an additional 90 employees. These additional employees are being used in the Department's increased effort aimed at controlling litter along the State's roadsides.

Maurice Smith, Director of Highways and Transportation, and Governor Bill Clinton announced the program at a Capitol news conference May 19. The Governor also announced a new program administered by the Employment Security Division aimed at providing employment in conservation and beautification for low-income young people in eleven high unemployment counties in Arkansas."

"These programs do double duty for Arkansas," Clinton said. "Not only will they provide jobs for young people that need

them, but their work will help beautify our state, especially during vacation season when we have so many visitors from other parts of the country."


Smith commented that "Each summer the Highway Department hires 200 students, age 18 and older, from throughout the State to work in each of the ten districts and the Central Office. The 90 additional youths will be used solely for litter control."


With more than 100,000 acres of highway right-of-way to maintain along the 16,150-mile State Highway System, litter control has become a major problem. Nearly \$700,000 is spent annually to pick it up.

Last year the State Highway Commission initiated an Adopt-A-Highway Program and increased its efforts in the Wildflower Program. Both of these programs provide for volunteer groups to adopt a section of highway for the purpose of litter control or beautification. The object of the programs is to increase public awareness of the monumental task of managing Arkansas' rights-of-way, and to promote public involvement.





Department Buys Wildflower Seed Planter

The AHTD Environmental Division purchased a new wild-flower seed planter which will be used to plant wildflower seeds in selected highway rights-of-way throughout the State. According to AHTD Biologist Wendy Welch, the seeder was purchased for use in a research project being conducted by the Division on the effects of herbicides on wildflower populations.

The planter, which is pulled behind a tractor, is capable of planting various types and sizes of seeds without disturbing the

surrounding vegetation. Up until now, seed planting required the ground to be plowed up, which accelerates weed growth and damages the appearance of the landscape.

Welch commented that the new planter will make planting much easier and faster during the research project. She said she also plans to use the planter in efforts to expand the Wildflower Program, one of the Department's citizen involvement projects.
